## INDIAN FACTOR AGAIN IN SRI LANKAN

he Indian factor is once again entering the politics of Sri Lanka.

Last week, the' Eelanatham' the daily belanatham the daily official newspaper of the Tigers, came down hard on the government for its alleged dealings with alleged dealings with the Indian govern-ment. Some political analysts believe that one reason why the Tigers are adopting a Tigers are adopting a tough stance on peace negotiations with the government is because of their suspicions of links between Colombo and New Delhi, vis-a-vis the LTTE.

The 'Feelanatham' in its Editorial had taken up the govern-ment on three issues. The first point made is when the Peoples Alliance triumphed, the special Envoy of Indian Prime Minister Mr. Nara Simha Rao, Mr. Verma had deli-Mr. Verma had delivered a special letter to Ms. Kumaratunga. The contents of this letter had not been divulged, the paper has claimed divulged, the has claimed.

The second issue is that when Foreign Minister Mr. Lakshman Kadirgamar went on an official visit to New Delhi in early December last year, he had conveyed a special message to the Indian Prime Minister. The LTTE suspects that they were a subject of discussion. During Mr. Kadirgamar's press conference held in New Delhi, he was specifically

lhi, he was specifically asked by Indian correspondents about the message he had carried from President Kumaratunga to the

Indian Prime Minister. Mr. Kadirgamar assured Indian journalists that it was one of good wishes and nothing more.

Political analysts note that despite the Indian hostility towards the LTTE, the Sri Lankan Foreign Minister was not critical of the Tigers during the visit. He even evinced understanding of the LTTE when he spoke of the tragedy of the war and ng of the LITE when he spoke of the tragedy of the war and said that the people of Jaffna were the vic-tims of the war. When he commisserated with the Indian sol-diers who died on Sri Lankan soil as well as the thousands of Sri Lankan servicmen who were killed he also noted that the LTTE too had fought and were still fighting for a cause they be-lieved in adding that it was another matter whether the means justified the end or whether war itself was the means through which the problem could be resolved. Many observers thought that the Sri Lanka 'foreign minis-Lanka foreign minister was sending a message to the Tigers from New Delhi.

Despite the deep scepticism of the Indi-

scepticism of the Indians on whether the Sri Lankan government would work out a durable peace with the LTTE — India having tried and failed — Mr. Kadirgamar said that there was hope that peace could be achieved.

The Third point made in the journal is that there was clear evidence of collaboration between Colombo and New Delhi
