## Kilali: what some observers can't see

As the night enveloped the waters off the hamlet of Kilali lists Monday the drone of outboard motors rose above the sound of dull winds.

The boat service operated by the LTTE, in open defiance of a "no go zone" declared by the security forces, was in full swing. Then suddenly SLAF aircraft began to intercept them. Both the Sri Lanka Army and the Navy also joined in with counter measures.

This fresh offensive beginning November 1 was the main military operation in the area after the controversial seven-day long "Operation Yal Devi". Its aim was to restrict, if not prevent altogether, boat movements from Kilali to Sinna Paranthan.

The report said the matter has received their careful consideration in the past several days.
