We did not object at first, because we were sure that he would be rejected as he was underage. But he was called for the interview. This worried us, as we wanted him to complete his studies. As he was detremined to go ahead, we did not want to stop him. He kept telling us that there was no point in completing his studis as it would take many years to complete his University education", Janaka's father said.

With time the Kahandawelas had got used to their son's daring job. "We still cannot believe that he is no more, because Janaka had escaped death many times. He used to come and tell us how his plane escaped enemy fire. Although it made us upset, he was never worried", the father said

With tears, Janaka's fathersaid from the time he could remember, all Janaka insisted was that he be given toy soldiers, and planes. "We too gave him all these because we loved him. But in return we have to undergo this heartbreak", he said.

It had been only two months since Janaka entered wedded life.
"It's such an unfortunate way to

lose him. He was only 27 years old."

The last time his parents had seen him was when Janaka and his wife Rashnie had visited home on Sunday. "He spent the whole day with us. He even brought some vegetables from the pola", said Janaka's father.

A product of Royal College Colombo, Janaka had excelled in both studies and sports. "He captained the school football team, and took part in boxing and baseball. He had a very good personality", he said.
