in the next few weeks the go-vernment negotiators will have to come to grips with these issues and make headway. How does the government provide an escape route to the LTTE rank and file? The go-vernment will have to work out a general amnesty. This will be complicated because Prabhaka-

ran and many of his top asso-ciates are wanted for the murder of several thousand Sri Lankans and Indians? These are the pressures and the complexities of negotiating with complexities of negotiating with a militant group as ruthless and devious as the LTTE. Therefore, working out lasting peace is diffi-cult, particularly in the face of India's position vis-a-vis the LTTE after the LTTE-IPKF

It is a fact that even after the IPKF left the Sri Lankan shores, Indian operations against the LTTE did not cease. India con-tinues to sink LTTE ships, impri-son their supporters and cadres and even create rifts within the

LTTE, the biggest being between Mahattaya and Prabhakaran. India has privately conveyed its displeasure over Premier Kuma-Intrus may prove over Premier Kuma-ratunga's decision to negotiate with the LTTE As long as the LTTE is in political or military power, India will continue to avenge the death of Rajiv Gand-hi and thousands of other Indians consumed by the LTTE.

The continuity of the talks The continuity of the talks itself will depend on the willing-ness and the ability of the new government to alleviate these in-herent and acquired fears and provide some form of security to the LTTE rank and file.
