Wickremesinghe said yesterday that the Government had no alternative but to meet the tiger terrorists with force as all attempts made to resolve democratically the issue of the division of the country raised by the LTTE had failed.

He added that the LTTE had been called for talks over and over again, but they resorted to armed action.

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This was the case during the J. R. Jayewardene and Ranasinghe Premadasa regimes as well as during the present regime of of service. The SPC donated packages of books to school libraries selected on a district basis. The SPC set out Rs. 500,000 for the purpose.

He said that different sections in society came out with different opinions on the North-East issue. Some wanted the country divided, some others, not. But, whatever it is, the government is conscious of this matter and will tackle it very carefully.

He said that the Government had solved many problems. This problem remained to be solved.

The Prime Minister also

said that unlike in the past, the United National Party (UNP) Government had done a lot for the Tamil community. Tamil language was made a state language. Tamil students have equal opportunities like the Sinhalese students to enter Universities and also that Tamil population has equal job opportunities.

During the past regime, things were much different in the country. There was absolutely no press freedom. UNP meetings were banned. If by chance five UNPers got together, they were taken to the police station and punished. A person could carry only two measures of rice. Carrying more was an offence. Rice was not allowed on Tuesdays and Fridays. A person was given only two yards of cloth. And a whole lot of dirty measures were adopted by the earlier regime.

It was during such difficult times that Mr. Tyronne Fernando decided to leave aside his law profession and take up politics.

"Any citizen knows Tyrone's contribution to the country's uplift. President Wijetunga has also appointed him the chairman of a press committee that will be responsible to inform the people here and abroad of all the happenings in the North--East. Unlike in the past, today there is complete press freedom," the Prime Minister said.
